

Information on Prop. 64:

Prop. 64 does not allow marijuana to be smoked in public places, in moving vehicles, or within 1,000 feet of a school, daycare or youth center while children are present.

Prop. 64 allows for local governments to regulate many aspects of marijuana.

Rancho Cordova has the following regulations in place. These regulations have not been affected by Prop. 64:

- It is illegal to grow marijuana outdoors anywhere in the City.
- It is legal to grow a small amount (up to 25 square feet) of marijuana within a private home or an enclosed and secure structure on a residential parcel:
 - by a resident of the home,
 - with permission of the owner,
 - with a local permit, and
 - under the regulations found in Municipal Code Chapter 6.90.
- Marijuana may not be grown at any residence where a minor resides.
- Marijuana dispensaries are illegal in the City.
- It is illegal to smoke marijuana anywhere in the City where smoking is prohibited. This includes e-cigarettes and similar devices.
 - Rancho Cordova's smoking ordinance prohibits smoking in public places, including restaurant and bar patio areas, and public events such as festivals, concerts, and farmers' markets.
 - It is illegal to smoke in public parks or on public open space under Prop. 64, which prohibits the smoking of marijuana in public places.

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Information on the Plastic Bag Ban and Prop. 67:

Prop. 67, which upholds the single-use plastic bag ban previously passed by the State Legislature, was passed by California voters this week.

This means that the plastic bag ban passed by the Legislature in 2014 goes back into effect *immediately* in California. Because Rancho Cordova did not have any type of local plastic bag ban in place, this will be an adjustment for many local shoppers.

Under the law:

- Large grocery stores, pharmacies, convenience stores and liquor stores may not provide single-use plastic bags to customers.
- Single-use bags are allowed for produce, meat, bread and bulk food items.
- Stores must charge 10 cents for recycled and reusable bags. The fee goes into a special fund to cover the cost of the bags and to educate consumers.
- Stores may not charge customers for bags if they are using a payment card or voucher from the California Supplemental Food Program.

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
